Neighbourhood Heritage Working Day –

Saturday 12 March 2016

The Russell Street/Castle Hill Conservation Area is long overdue for reappraisal. The aim of the Day was for local residents to learn about and help conduct the appraisal. Around 30 people took part in the event, including Councillor Tony Page who gave a brief introductory talk. After this our chairman Karen Rowland took us through how Historic England suggests volunteers to carry out a Conservation Area appraisal. After this each group of volunteers was issued with a clipboard and appraisal forms to be completed. Our job was to appraise and record what gives our streets "special character" in terms of architecture or historical association, and to record any issues that add to or detract from that special character.



Thanks to the good attendance, we were able to form enough groups to cover the whole of the Conservation Area plus some additional streets that we think might be added, notably the Oxford Road from Prospect Street to Reading West Railway Bridge.

The groups returned to The Oasis in time for a fine afternoon tea. The completed appraisal forms handed in by the groups are informing the final appraisal report that will be submitted to the Council for approval and public consultation. Thanks to all who took part and made it happen!

Annual General Meeting report –

Wednesday 20 April 2016

Progress this year:

- Secured a £25,000 grant from People's Health Trust for this year and next year with the sole focus
 of bringing residents together which has allowed us to:
 - hired our own part-time administrator
 - expand and develop our range of events-from fitness to special interest, running 2-3 events every week for local residents
- Worked others (e.g. Reading Borough Council, Thames Valley Police, Oxford Road NAG, Historic England) to improve our neighbourhood:
 - Partner in Anstey Road street bin project
 - addressed rat problems
 - ♦ Secured Article 4 for Jesse Terrace ("Article 4 means all conversions from a house to individual room lets need planning permission)
 - ◊ IDR planters
 - reducing antisocial behaviour resulting from street drinking and particular business practices
 - more trees in the neighbourhood
 - monitored area planning applications
 - integral in establishing Reading's first Conservation Area Advisory Committee (CAAC) to protect our heritage

Our founder and Chair Karen Rowland having lead BSANA since she organised the first meeting at The Oasis in 2012, has stood down as chair. Our officers are now:
