Red Bows on Our Old Gas Lampposts

BSANA-ville has 3 old vintage lampposts in our area, that a campaign is trying to save from removal and replacement with modern LED lampposts. Red Christmas bows have recently gone up on the 3 lampposts in our area. We have two lampposts on Goldsmid Road and one on Franklin Street. These lampposts were mostly all made by local Reading iron foundries and whilst most of ours in our Conservation Area have gone, we're all for supporting the campaign to save these beauties! There are others slightly further afield on Lorne Street, Argyle Road, Argyle Street and 8 of them on Brunswick Hill!

The campaign has documented a way to save at least the cast iron bases of these old posts even if they do have to be fitted with LED lamps for the future.

Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs)

Begging - Dog control - Drug activity - Litter Motorbike nuisance - Street drinking

There will soon be a Reading Borough Council consultation about where the new "Public Space Protection Orders" (PSPOs) will be situated in Reading. The PSPOs replace the former "Designated Public Place Orders" (DPPOs), which were alcohol sales and street-drinking control areas. "Anti-Social Behaviour" (ASB) will be more thoroughly targeted as priorities within the new PSPOs. You can read the recent Council report on local ASB here:

Location Central Reading. Ideally lives, works or has an interest in the BSANA area.

Role Primarily to liaise with local residents and related organisations (e.g. businesses, faith groups, Reading Borough Council and Thames Valley Police), and to drive an events and activities programme.

Time This is a part-time role, currently 7 hours per week. The exact times worked are generally flexible and under the control of the post-holder.

Salary The living wage with pay rising as the living wage rises.

Qualifications You will need to be able to be able to work as a self- employed contractor. There are no formal qualifications for the role, but we are looking for someone with links into the community, and the ability to empathise and support residents as well as to interact with other organisations.

Typical Meeting local residents and understanding what BSANA can do to help **activities** create a sense of community. Planning and attending events, with a team.

Role duration At the start, there will be a chance to meet with the outgoing community and the liaison officer and you will get additional support as you get acquainted future with the role. The role is initially probationary for 3 months and then until 15 July 2019, which is the length of our grant



Neighbourhood Watch

We had a very successful first meeting to form a Neighbourhood Watch. Liz Herbert from Thames Valley Police briefed us on how to form a group and answered our questions.



The area covered will be in the BSANA area, from Russell Street to the IDR.

We are considering one large Neighbourhood Watch area, with each street having its own person or people to act as a contact.

If you would like to be involved, just email watch@bsana.org It doesn't involve patrolling the streets, just reporting anything you see or hear. Also there's occasional emails which you can receive (if you want them) that keeps you updated on Neighbourhood Watch news. Your name will not be public and no one will know who on your street is in the Neighbourhood Watch.

To note, there is already an on-going Neighbourhood Watch in the BSANA area west of Russell Street (email watch@bsana.org for more information).



Do you recognise this location?

William Henry Fox Talbot invented a process for creating reasonably light-fast and permanent photographs that was the first made available to the public. He lived and worked in Baker Street (there's even a plaque to identify his house). The pictures above show the backs of the houses from 55 Baker Street on the left (his Studio) to 33-35 on the far right, with Fox Talbot himself (shown on the far right of the left picture). You can still recognise the backs of these houses and the rooflines today. Fox Talbot created the first mass-produced book that contained actual photographs ,"The Pencil of Nature", which was published while he was living in Reading.

The photographs were taken in 1846.
