Can those four saplings in the church forecourt really be the same four trees still growing there today?

Major stonework repairs to the church façade and bell turret were carried out about 20 years ago. After work started, the area of loose or decaying stonework proved to be more extensive than expected and sadly the money ran out before the spire on the bell turret could be rebuilt.

In the centre of the Oxford Road is one of the impressive double-branched standards carrying the overhead cables for the electric trams which were introduced in 1903 and ran until 1939.

Help our area shine with the RAYS scheme

The Reading Adopt Your Street scheme is a partnership between local residents volunteering to help keep our streets tidy. Reading Council will still do all the street cleaning it already does. In addition the Council now provides BSANA with gloves, litter pickers and bags as long as volunteers agree to clean a street (or two) at least once a month.

If you can give us a choice, in case someone else has agreed to do your first choice, that would be appreciated. Remember, if streets are generally clean, that discourages others from dropping litter, so they tend to remain cleaner.

Heritage Crime: Paint ruins listed building

Overnight on Monday 29th – Tuesday 30th October, this house on Russell Street was vandalised with paint severely affecting both a listed building and the people who live there. It is a devastating blow to our community.

Being Bath stone, the removal and treatment is very challenging and costly so as not to further ruin the historic fabric of the building.


Russell Street is a main thoroughfare and bus route. It's quite possible that anyone may have seen someone on the street, or on Oxford Road or Tilehurst Road on that night carrying pots of paint, or otherwise acting suspiciously.

We know we're all keen to stop this kind of behaviour in our neighbourhood and we'd urge you to report anything you saw that evening.

Our Conservation Area is recognised to be "At Risk" – it's official!

After years of diplomatic lobbying by BSANA, and with the invaluable help and support of Cllrs Tony Page and Karen Rowland, we have succeeded in getting the Russell Street / Castle Hill Conservation Area listed by Historic England on their Heritage at Risk register.









The listing has followed recognition by Reading Borough Council that this Conservation Area, and the character that makes it special, is under serious threat of ongoing degradation and that there needs to be an affordable action plan aimed at stopping and reversing the decline. There are many reasons for the decline, most of them beyond the power of the local Council to control. The Council is therefore not to blame for the decline and it is to the Council's credit that they have been willing to work with BSANA and with Historic England to explore how the Conservation Area might be better protected and improved.









Although getting an "at risk" listing might sound like bad news, it is potentially a very positive development in two ways. Firstly, the listing by Historic England is intended by them to act as a wake-up call to all who live or work in the area or who have the care of property there. This is because any successful action plan cannot depend on the Council alone but will need to enlist the goodwill and co-operation of everyone in the area or at least a large section of the community.

Secondly, a degraded Conservation Area that has been officially listed as "at risk", and for which there is a commendable heritage improvement project, is eligible to apply to Historic England for a match funding grant to help pay for the project.









So the good news is that we have achieved the "at risk" listing and now we need to come up with an affordable action plan, hopefully to include a specific heritage improvement project for at least part of the area. We are delighted to say that the Council are already in dialogue with Historic England about possible funding for our Conservation Area and the outlook appears very encouraging. Watch this space for further announcements in the coming months.

Anstey Road Communal Bins

As you may know, due to the narrow pavements and limited front gardens, the normal red and grey bins on Anstey Road were replaced by red recycling boxes (kept inside the house) and larger communal grey bins on the street. However the communal bins attract fly-tipping (which is


illegal) – see the picture on the right. Reading Borough Council is looking at options, including penalties for anyone caught flytipping.

It should be noted that the communal bins are for Anstey Road scheme residents only. It is critical that all residents use the facilities provided for them. If you need more recycling bins, please contact Reading Borough Council. More items can now be recycled, this should give you more room in your grey bins. Put all cardboard and paper in the recycling containers. There is also glass and paper recycling at the IDR end of Baker Street.

When you do have large items to be removed, you can speak to your landlord, take them to the Re3 tip (down Rose Kiln Lane), pay the council to remove your bulky waste, or (if still useful to someone) offer them on Freegle or LETS.


Zumba ... coming soon
